## Phase 1: Interviews with children

We have now completed interviews with children for the year and have thoroughly enjoyed learning about their reading experiences and ideas to encourage book reading. We're now analysing the data (preregistration plan here <a href="https://osf.io/5ztjk">https://osf.io/5ztjk</a>) and hope to be able to share some of the themes we identified soon.

# Phase 2: Co-designing the intervention

As Phase 1 comes to an end, it's almost time to commence Phase 2! We have recently received ethical approval to proceed with the co-design aspect of the project. Early next year we will be preregistering this phase and recruiting six teachers to co-create the Love to Read intervention. We're very excited about this phase of the project and may ask members of the team, and expert advisory group, to suggest teachers who they think would be well placed to support with this activity.

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#### Illustrations

Early next year we hope to be able to share some of the illustrations that have been created for the Love to Read project. This work has been created by a very talented illustrator <u>Katie McPherson</u> and graphic designer <u>Chris Brodt</u> who proposed three very different illustration ideas for the project. We decided to leave the decision to children, and over the last couple of weeks we have asked five classes of primary school children to vote on their favourite option, and give us feedback to ensure the illustrations really capture their interest and imagination. The most popular illustration theme chosen was 'powerful portals' and we hope to be able to share these illustrations soon.

For the UKLA, we hope to discuss Love to Read as part of a symposium entitled: Better together: Co-designing literacy interventions with children, young people, teachers and other professionals (led by Sarah McGeown). For SSSR, we have also submitted a proposal as part of a symposium entitled: Connecting reading research and practice: identifying need and implementing interventions (led by Jessie Ricketts).
