Week 1 Induction to Course ARTX11050

The course aims to help you determine, master, synthesise and apply a range of innovative methods that will support the production, distribution and consumption of your own artistic research project

Research on, and through, Contemporary Art advances knowledge, makes a valuable contribution to the discipline of Contemporary Art and offers new insights within a of broader context of research.

This research capstone course provides you (CATs) with the invaluable experience of designing, conducting, analysing and disseminating your own artistic research project, consolidating the knowledge and understanding gained during the taught stages of your programme. It will support you to become an effective research project manager, able to draw on and design a range of project management techniques and tools. It will help you to become an insightful, responsive, ethical and highly capable, independent researcher who can identify and tackle intellectual risk.

Classes are designed to scaffold, develop and align your artistic research skills with the Vitae Researcher Development Framework. We place a particular emphasis on designing interdisciplinary methods and developing innovative forms of

'research creation'. The researcher's journey can be lonely one: CATs will continue to work and play-test in their small supportive groups (basho of 4 or 5 peers) when developing their individual research projects.

You are a researcher

This part of your programme is not taught, it is researcher-led. This means you need to demonstrate that you are a capable independent researcher. This independence is what determines your 'mastery' of contemporary art theory. Being independent doesn't mean you can't ask for help — your Supervisor and Programme Director are here to mentor and support you — so, if in doubt, ask for help when you need it.

Working in a research-rich context you will develop your research and enquiry-led skills to support your own original research in the core discipline of contemporary art. You may choose to do this autonomously or in partnership with our industry (non-academic organisations, artists, curators, etc.)

As a researcher, you will determine if you wish to pursue artistic research or theoretical research. This determination will be explicit in the final body of work you submit for assessment.

While the final outcome of your research is vital to assessment of your skills, it is your development as an independent researcher that is of paramount importance.

Researcher Development

Your research should enable you to develop all five Characteristics 1-5 of SCQF Level 11 while supporting the research skills and attributes delineated within the UK's Vitae Researcher Development Framework, the European Higher Education Area's Salzburg Principles (2010) on researcher

development.

Additionally, for those of you taking the project option, it's expected that you draw upon the (subject-specific) ELIA 'Florence Principals' on Artistic Research (2016) and its 2013 SHARE Handbook. Following these frameworks will prepare you to continue to work as researchers both in the professional contemporary artworld and in higher education (SCQF Level 12).

Key Researcher Attributes and Skills

All MA CATs should be able to demonstrate that they are competent researchers. Through the completion of your Masters Project, you should be able to demonstrate your ability to:

- develop peer support networks to support individual research projects.
- offer new insights within a of broader context of research.
- determine, master, synthesise and apply a range of research methods
- understand and apply the ethical frameworks of research to become an insightful, responsive, ethical researcher
- understand and engage with impact and knowledge exchange
- become an effective project manager able to draw on and design a range of project management techniques and tools.
- tackle and manage intellectual risk
- •learn how to analyse, evaluate, problem solve and synthesise your own research with that of others.
- foreground self-reflection and carefully evidenced argument construction.
- see beyond immediate questions to unexplored areas that anticipate cutting-edge research questions
- develop and execute a professionally resolved research project and subject this to public scrutiny/peer review

- understand, interpret, create and communicate appropriately within an academic context and an artistic context.
- •use visual communication media in ways that are appropriate, clear and consummately designed.

Managing your Time

Time management

It's important to maintain a strict discipline, researching and writing on a daily basis, and setting yourself with draft deadlines each week.

If you divide up the total number words you can write by the total number of days you have to complete the writing — you will be able to set and meet realistic targets each day.

Use the Pomodoro Technique □ (e.g. Be Focused desktop app for Apple is a typical pomodoro style timer:

Pomodoro involves working in sessions of 20mins with short breaks. You take a long break after 4-5 sessions.
