About the Festival

We Play Festival is a collaboration between The University of Edinburgh, The Play Cafe Project, Froebelian Futures, and The Scottish Storytelling Centre supported by a host of other partners - to celebrate and promote more child-and community-centered public spaces in our cities. Designed with and for children, families, childminders, early years practitioners, policymakers and thirdsector partners. We Play comprises:

A week-long drop-in play cafe co-developed with the UK's leading child-led kindergarten resource designers, Community Playthings.

A series of scheduled talks, discussions, arts, well-being, music, storytelling, and film events; all in the welcoming surroundings of The Scottish Storytelling Centre.

We Play aims to blaze a trail for a kind of public space we want to see cultivated right across Scotland: one which fosters community, support, and knowledge exchange between diverse individuals and organizations concerned with children's rights, play, equity, and innovation. At the heart of this initiative is to prototype a radical new public space for children and families where research, knowledge exchange, teaching, practice, and everyday life are integrated, so that the highest quality of early learning and childcare is provided to all children (with a focus on the most marginalized children), and young children's rights are implemented.

As part of the project, we will co-design through community engagement what this space could look like (e.g. physically and in terms of its ethos, ways of working, activities and practices, etc), by engaging with a range of organizations working with children and families in the early years, with a particular focus on families from marginalized and disadvantaged backgrounds.

Take One Action Film festivals

Does God exist? What happens when we die?

Brussels' Molenbeek district has been, for most outsiders, synonymous with violent jihadism. For six-year-old friends Aatos and Amine, however, it is just home: the playground in which they listen to spiders whisper, or argue over who will get the front seat on the magic carpet that will take them to the land of their ancestors.

Finno-Chilean Aatos lives in the same apartment block as Amine, whose family originates from Morocco. Their daily lives, though markedly different, are shaped by this ethnically diverse neighbourhood, and in the boys' imagination, the exploits of Nordic gods compete with the tales of the Quran. One fateful day, their carefree universe is rocked by violent terrorist attacks in Brussels. Heavily armed soldiers now patrol the streets, while grown-ups seem very anxious. This gorgeously playful meditation on childhood, faith and friendship bears witness to children's resilience in the face of global events, and pays tribute to community cohesion.

Short films: Inner Lives, Outer Worlds

Take One Action Film festivals

This short film programme curated by Take One Action invites us to explore the relationship between the inner lives of children and the outer worlds they are embedded in. Here, the illuminating fullness of a child's perspective is celebrated - the poignant understandings, their voice, their astute critiques of what constrains their lives, and their immense creativity in imagining and bringing into being kinder, different, and more playful worlds.

Spanning animation to documentary, this programme brings us in conversation with children from Scotland to Syria, all navigating the constraints and possibilities of their unique surroundings. Play and imagination are world-interpreting and world-changing forces, bridging these children's rich inner lives and the expansive ways they interact with and alter the material world around them. Each film makes visible a dimension of children's rights we must continue fighting to uphold: the right to green space, the right to safe and unpolluted environments, the right to safety from conflict and displacement, and the right to play. It is an invitation to be fully present in looking at the world through a child's eyes – and to collectively demand safety, fulfilment, and joy for children everywhere.

Featuring:

We Know a Better Word than Happy (Helen McCrorie, 2022, UK) A gentle short documentary capturing children's delight in the possibilities for fun and learning in an urban green space established by community activism in Maryhill, Glasgow.

Packing a Wave (Edu Glez, 2021, Spain) Being stranded alone on an island is no fun. This animated short film tells the story of a young girl who finds herself in this situation with nothing but a life jacket.

The Big House (Musa Syeed, 2014, Yemen) When a Yemeni boy finds a key to the empty mansion down the street, he lets himself and his imagination run wild in the big house.

Rock Pools (Animation An Talla - various creators, 2022, UK) Playful stop motion short exploring damage to nature - made by a group of children as part of Keep Scotland Beautiful's 1.5 Degree filmmaking challenge.

Yaman (Amer Albarzawi, 2016, Syria) Yaman, a young inventor, proudly reveals his greatest invention: an incredible machine that can work wonders with paper tissues and render him invulnerable. While Yaman lets his imagination run riot, the outside world turns out to be far less magical.

Tiny Souls (Dina Naser, 2013, Syria/Jordan) 9-year-old Marwa is a lively, inquisitive child, whose interests revolve around playtime, school and her siblings. She and her family live in Jordan's Za'atari camp, the world's largest camp for Syrian refugees, and hope to return home soon.

Making space for play in Scotland taking forward UN recommendations on children's right to play and public spaces

Observatory of Children's Human Rights Scotland

This panel will discuss what the recently published UN Committee on the Rights of the Child's Concluding Observations mean for children's right to play in Scotland, with a particular focus on ensuring all children have access to public play spaces.

The panel will be hosted by the Observatory of Children's Human Rights Scotland and chaired by Children and Young People's Commissioner Scotland Nicola Killean. Panel speakers will include Dr Laura Wright (Associate member of the Observatory and Lecturer in Childhood Studies at MHSES), Theresa Casey (writer on play and children's rights, and past-President of the International Play Association), and Marguerite Hunter Blair (Chief Executive of Play Scotland). We will additionally be joined by Natalie Don MSP, the Minister for Children, Young People and Keeping the Promise.

The UN Committee on the Rights of the Child is a panel of international experts who uphold the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in all signatory countries. Every signatory is periodically reviewed by the UN Committee on the state of children's rights in their country, which results in a list of recommendations to be nationally implemented by the next review: the Concluding Observations. Scotland and the UK were reviewed earlier this year.

Film screening: "In my Blood It Runs"

Take One Action Film

Logline: Critically acclaimed documentary exposing Australia's systemic racism, told through the eyes of charismatic 10-year-old Arrente/Garrwa boy, Dujuan and his family. An intimate story of struggle, strength and love.

Synopsis: Dujuan is a 10-year-old Arrente/Garrwa boy from Mparntwe (Alice Springs) in Australia. Thanks to his mother and grandmother's guidance, he speaks three languages, is a child-healer and an accomplished hunter.

Though Dujuan is highly intelligent and sensitive, he is "failing" in school, where his wisdom and strengths are not valued. He seems disengaged and bored; his frustration takes a toll on his self esteem. He starts skipping school and staying out late – and faces increasing scrutiny from welfare officers and the police. As the age of criminal responsibility is just 10 in Australia, the threat of juvenile detention looms (100% of the inmates in Alice Springs' juvenile detention centres are Aboriginal)... But as soon as Dujuan is "on country," away from the city, he ponders his future and, somewhere in between, finds space to dream.

Filmed in direct collaboration with Dujuan and his family, this striking documentary illustrates their fight to decolonise the school system and develop a curriculum that enables Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islands people to determine and lead their own education.

Content notes: Contains depictions of racism, colonialism and state violence (incl. against young people). Contains discussions of substance abuse, suicide ideation.
