Good Afternoon

I am one of the Community Sergeants based at the West End Police Station, Torphichen Street, Edinburgh. My Community Team and the City of Edinburgh Council are currently trying to address the drink/drug fuelled anti-social behaviour at Hunter Square, Edinburgh. To date we have had some success in tackling the problem through high visibility targeted patrols, and the careful application of bail conditions for repeat offenders. There are many contributory factors to the anti-social behaviour experienced in this area, the public toilets in particular were a haven for drug taking and other illegal activity. In January we got approval to close the toilets.

The efforts and action taken thus far has proved effective however one of the longer term solutions we are looking at is changing the use/design of the area to make it a more attractive area for people to sit and enjoy whilst at the same time making it less attractive to those who wish to cause anti social behaviour. I am looking at the possibility of getting a student or students from the ECA who would be willing to get involved in suggesting ideas, designs that change Hunter Square into a more welcoming and vibrant space through clever design or artwork. We have not really discussed any potential budget, however, I think in the current climate it would be extremely limited if available at all. I appreciate that the students will have other work on which takes priority over this but it would be a good way of getting the students involved in a project that would proved long term benefits for the community whilst at the same time giving them a platform to display their talents.

The aim is for students and academics to work together with the local community to improve the environment and life of Hunter Square.


The objectives of the project are:

Fiona Rankin on plans for the futrue development of the Hunter Square and the Tron Lesley MCara on stakeholder views






Hunter square

The square to the south of Tron Kirk is named after Sir James Hunter Blair, who was MP for Edinburgh 1780-84 and Lord Provost 1784-86. In that capacity he was responsible for the South Bridge project and the curbing of the expensive ambition of Robert Adam. The square and Blair Street alongside, commemorate his role.

THE TRON KIRK

The Tron was one of the four parishes of Edinburgh but shared St Giles, which was subdivided, with the parish of that name. The church was built on the instruction of Charles I who introduced Anglican reforms into the Scottish church in the early 1630s and made St Giles into a cathedral (which it had never been before, or since). That removed the subdivisions and pushed the Tron congregation out.

Research



The students visited the site with John Lowrey to learn of the history and significance of the Hunter Square and the Tron in the development of the Old Town.

The students then undertook a series of interviews with local businesses. With Lesley MCara the team of student undertook an ad hoc user survey of visitors to the square.

Presentation and Feedback



The three teams of students each presented their proposals to a group of residents, stakeholders and businesses.
