The Technician Commitment

We are now in the second year of our two year Action Plan for the Technician Commitment to improve visibility, recognition, career development and sustainability of technical skills.



It is the joint effort of all on the Technician Steering Committee (TSC) to help in the delivery of this. The TSC has representation from across all colleges and campuses of the University and includes technicians and technical managers and members from the Department for Social Responsibility and Sustainability, the Institute for Academic Development and Central HR: Learning and Development. We meet to discuss progress and develop initiatives that match our two year Action Plan, while responding to new national developments in the higher education technical community. Reports published in the past 12 months on mental health and equality, diversity and inclusion of technicians have raised important considerations for higher education across the UK and we aim to consider these in our next action plan - due in Autumn 2020.

We are making great progress in many areas. In December I was pleased to host an event at the QMRI with Prof Moira Whyte, that celebrated the Modern Apprentices and Foundation Apprentices within the University - engaging in apprenticeship schemes is meeting our technical sustainability goals. We have 5 technical Foundation Apprentices this year and are seeking more placements for this autumn. For technical staff Career Development there is now a programme of courses which has been developed by Joanna Fairweather in Learning & Development and Nicola Cuthbert in IAD. Professional Registration is a great opportunity for personal development - Val Gordon, our Technician Commitment Project Coordinator is a huge advocate of this. Following the launch of our Professional Registration Fund in September 2019, a cohort of 34 staff across the University are working towards Professional Registration through the Science Council. For more news on Professional Registration watch this space. In this edition of the newsletter you will also read about the technician-led Arts Exhibition held at the Edinburgh College of Art in December - a great opportunity to recognise their contribution to the College of Art and to raise visibility too.

We continue to consider ways to improve recognition and visibility for technical staff across the university, raising awareness of opportunities on the dedicated technician <u>website</u> and on <u>twitter</u>. We welcome any suggestions you may have.

Modern Apprentice and Foundation Apprentice Celebration Event, Thu 12th December, QMRI


One of the four pillars of the Technician Commitment is sustainability. Engaging in the University's apprentice programmes is one route to sustaining technical skills at the University.




Five to Follow

Equality, Diversity and Inclusion: A Technician Lens

This technician-focused EDI report was launched at the STEMM-CHANGE annual conference in November.



Initiatives to advance equality, diversity and inclusion in higher education have focused on the academic and research community. It is vital to appreciate that EDI challenges do not just apply to these staff groups. The expansion of the Athena Swan Charter to include professional and support staff has ignited a greater interest in the equality, diversity and inclusion within these groups. It is arguable that the issues are often more serious in these communities, which include technicians, where EDI practices are often not as advanced.

This report addressed EDI challenges facing technicians, interesting findings were:

- technical colleagues often unaware of the EDI challenges they faced within their own community and unfamiliar with initiatives such as the Athena Swan
- · a lack of inclusion of technical staff representation on institutional EDI committees
- · a need to increase diversity in technical roles
- a need for all technicians to receive EDI training (see here for a list of UoE EDI on-line courses)

A 2hr session providing an overview of the new technicians career development programme, including tools and opportunities available from within the University and beyond.


Taking Steps to Plan Your Career

Organised by the National Technician Development Centre, with a closing date of 9th February 2020 with a £150 prize.



Technical Services Solar Tracker Tester (AKA "The Scorpion")

Our Engineering School's Technical Team were given a general brief, from the course organisers, to develop a testing system for our 1st year student's Engineering Design 1 projects (current student project is to design and build a small solar tracking and energy storage system).



Working collectively, across the disciplines, a small group of our Technicians carried out experiments (on suitable light sources), designed and manufactured the mechanical assemblies, the electrical & electronic signal conditioning & controls and developed software to produce a working system.

The LabVIEW & Arduino based system controls the sequence of lights, while also controlling the rotation of the project on a turn-table (to approximate the path of the Sun). The system was used, by the students, to demonstrate the mechanical Sun tracking operation, of their project, while also being able to measure the system power (from the solar-cells, consumed by their tracker control system and remaining power to charge the battery pack).
